How to Start your Job Search

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t is time to think of jobs! Some Workforce Education and Development students are graduating by the end of this year and others are already searching for jobs. Searching for a job may be a daunting or an exciting process; it is all about attitude. So, you better choose to enjoy the journey and get started!

You will have to do extensive research to ace cover letters, resumes/CVs and interviews, as well as how to utilize networks, social media and job boards. You may not need a job immediately; but it is wise to prepare and build your networks, when you are not under stress of time limitations.

Assessment. Your job search is easier if you first decide what type of jobs and companies you are interested in. When you define what you enjoy doing and what you are good at, then you will know what types of jobs will be a good fit with your interests, experience and personality. You will be able to articulate clearly why you are the right candidate for the position.

Good fit companies. You may check in professional networks, such as LinkedIn, for people that hold those types of jobs and find what kind of experience, skills and personality your target companies look for. Make a list of the Top 10 companies where you may be a good job candidate.

Networks. Tell your friends, alumni networks, ex-colleagues, associates, previous supervisors, and other contacts that you are in the job market. Strike up conversations and make new contacts, including people from other fields. Although research indicates that most jobs come through networking, do subscribe to relevant RSS feeds to receive new postings. Also, contact recruiters in your field to be ready for future opportunities. Do not depend on only one source. *(CONTINUED ON PAGE 2)*




Jessica Lovette (center) with the 437th Maintenance Training Section.

In 2002, Jessica Lovette earned her bachelor's degree in Workforce Education and Development (WED), and she is still using the degree 15 years later. When she decided to pursue the WED degree, she was an active duty Air Force NCO and a single parent. She had just been retained for training management with the USAF, where she worked on curriculum development in the Aircraft Maintenance Training Division. For her career aspirations and personal needs, the schedule-friendly classes of the SIU WED program were her ticket to a great future! While on active duty, Jessica was a training

manager, training scheduler, curriculum developer and assistant supervisor over the aircraft maintenance schoolhouse. When Jessica left active duty, she returned to the same aircraft maintenance training schoolhouse as the director of training for the C-17 Aircraft Maintenance Group. The training group is responsible for diverse training programs and formal schools for more than 1,400 military and civilian aircraft maintenance technicians, and it serves as the primary training organization for C-17 aircraft maintenance training for eight bases across Air Mobility Command.

Today, with 18 years of experience in adult education and technical training, Jessica still uses her WED degree skills, which have led her and the maintenance training organization to receive recognition as the Command's Maintenance Training Section of the Year twice (2013 and 2016). The personnel she oversees have also been recognized numerous times as command-level instructors and training managers of the year. Jessica has also provided support as a supervisor to many of our WED internships. She believes that none of the organization or individuals' accomplishments would have been possible without the superior SIU WED program!



Vanessa Martin is the site liaison/program advisor at Charleston SIU Extended Campus. She works with the military, veterans and civilians, to help them achieve their educational goals by advising them on when to take classes.
